New Writing North is the literature development agency for the North of England, based in Newcastle upon Tyne where it was founded in 1996. Chief Executive Claire Malcolm leads a team of 13 staff producing nationally significant work in reading and writing development, including the Northern Writers' Awards, Durham Book Festival, the Gordon Burn Prize and New Writing North Young Writers.

Winner of a Northern Writers Award in fiction (2017), Yvonne was shortlisted for the Words and Women Competition (2017), the Sunderland University Waterstones SunStory Award in 2018, and awarded a Society of Author's Foundation Grant for Remembered in 2018. She was commended for children's writing in the Faber Andlyn BAME (FAB) Prize (2017) and has three titles in Penguin Random House's The Ladybird Tales of Superheroes and three in The Ladybird Tales of Crowns and Thrones. Yvonne has a PhD in Creative Writing from Lancaster University and is a 2019 British Library Eccles Centre Visiting Fellow, and Lecturer in Creative Writing and Creative Industries at Sheffield Hallam University.

She started her career at Unilever.

She has both client and agency experience and has worked on and across four continents for companies and brands as diverse as glue, JWT, Karmarama, Dove, Hilton, O2, the Army, and Jaguar, Crabtree & Evelyn. She has attended the soughtafter Google Creative Academy in Palo Alto. Elsewhere she has taught in Ghana at Publicis/Origin8; in the UK for Create Jobs, CreatED and the Bakkavor Board of Trustees; in Richmond, VA, USA for Hilton Hotels; and at EY in London.



She is the founder of her own consultancy, NOA. Naana strongly believes in the concept of "Each One, Teach One" and is a regular mentor. Kim Tserkezie

Kim Tserkezie has worked in broadcast media for twenty-five years, with a career spanning comedy, drama and documentary. She has worked many roles within the industry from acting to production. In 2019, she was named as one of the 100 most influential disabled people in the UK (Shaw Trust Power 100). In 2020, she won a Royal Television Society Award for best drama performance for her leading role in Obsession (BFI Network).

Kim got her first break as a presenter for BBC's Disability Today and From The Edge, often writing and producing her own items. From 2002-2005 Kim played Penny Pocket in BAFTA award winning, Balamory. This role won Kim an award from Whizz Kidz for representation.

Following Balamory, Kim found, frustratingly, she was rarely offered the chance to play 'characters,' only 'medical problems' and "stereotypical portrayals of disability". This led Kim to set up her own production company, Scattered Pictures. Since 2013, the company, based in Kim's home city of Newcastle Upon Tyne, has developed projects which showcase underrepresented, emerging talent. Kim believes "real change will happen when fair representation exists throughout the whole process on and off screen, from training and writing to directing right through to commissioning".

Kim has received drama and comedy writing commissions from BBC, ITV and C4. She is currently writing and producing screen projects with leading production companies including BBC Studios and IMG Productions. Projects in development include a new children's TV comedy series funded by the British Film Institute (BFI). Scattered



Pictures recently received its third radio documentary commission for BBC World Service. Kim presented the previous two documentaries which were well received across the globe and chosen as Pick of the Week by the Observer.

Kim is a full member of BAFTA and a board member of the Royal Television Society North East and the Borders. She is a member of BFI's Disability Advisory Group. She has chaired events for BFI including at London Film Festival and for Netflix. She wrote the semi-autobiographical children's book The Wheelie Wonderful Life of Millie Monroe.
