Read Regional returns! Digital author events from libraries across the North

Read Regional, the annual reading campaign for the North of England, returns this spring for a series of digital events hosted by libraries across the region.

Read Regional is a celebration of brilliant new books from the North of England, which was founded by New Writing North in 2008. The campaign is funded by Arts Council England and is produced in partnership with 23 library authorities across the region. In previous years it has profiled writers including AA Dhand, Andrew Michael Hurley and Jenn Ashworth.

The current programme began in 2020, but many events had to be put on hold due to Covid-19 restrictions.

Instead, the ten selected authors will be meeting audiences online from April until June. At the easy-to-access digital events, the authors will introduce their work and share stories about the writing process, as well as answering questions from audience members.

Read Regional's ten must-read titles by writers based in the North include Remembered by Yvonne Battle-Felton, which was longlisted for the Women's Prize for Fiction 2019; Supper Club, the debut novel by Lara Williams, which won the Guardian's Not the Booker Prize 2019; and Icebreaker, Somerset Maugham-winning writer Horatio Clare's travelogue aboard an icebreaker in Finland's waters.

Author biographies

Clara Barley has written both fiction and non-fiction about Anne Lister of Shibden Hall. Clara was inspired to write the novel through her work at Shibden Hall, and was also involved both behind the scenes and on camera with the *Gentleman Jack* TV series. She lives in Yorkshire.

Hafsah Aneela Bashir is a writer, playwright and performance poet based in Manchester. Her work has been published in several anthologies. She is founder and co-director of Outside The Frame Arts (OTFA), a collective platforming marginalised voices. She is currently The Royal Exchange Manchester's Supported Artist 2018–19, Longsight's Writer In Residence with Manchester Literature Festival and a 'Leader of Tomorrow' on the Artistic Director's Leadership Programme. She was recently awarded the prestigious Jerwood Compton Poetry Fellowship 2019, has performed for numerous festivals, is creating theatre work of her own exploring womanhood and heritage and is still a sane mother of five.

Yvonne Battle-Felton was born in Pennsylvania and raised in New Jersey. She holds an MA in Writing from Johns Hopkins University and a PhD in Creative Writing from Lancaster University where she is an associate Lecturer. A writer of fiction and creative non-fiction, her writing has been published in *riverSedge*, Assisi, Not Somewhere Else But Here: A Contemporary Anthology of Women and Place, Welter, Slices, and The Chesapeake Reader Literary Journal. Yvonne was a recipient of a Northern Writers' Award in 2017 for Remembered.

Horatio Clare is the bestselling author of the memoirs *Running for the Hills* and *Truant* and the travel books *A Single Swallow* (which follows the birds' migration from South Africa to the UK), Down to the Sea in Ships (the story of two voyages on container vessels) and *Orison for a Curlew*, a journey in search of one of the world's rarest birds. His books for children include Aubrey and the Terrible Yoot



and Aubrey and the Terrible Ladybirds. Horatio's essays and reviews appear on BBC radio and in the Financial Times, the Observer and the Spectator, among other publications. He lives with his family in West Yorkshire.

CJ Cooke is an acclaimed, award-winning poet, novelist and academic with numerous other publications under the name of Carolyn Jess-Cooke. Born in Belfast, she has a PhD in Literature from Queen's University, Belfast, and is currently Lecturer in Creative Writing at the University of Glasgow, where she researches creative writing interventions for mental health. I Know My Name was CJ Cooke's first psychological drama and was inspired by her creative work in mental health. There is a TV adaptation in development. CJ Cooke lives by the sea with her family.

Linda Green is the bestselling author of nine novels, including *And Then It* Happened and After I've Gone. She is an award-winning journalist and has written for *The Guardian, the Independent on Sunday* and the *Big Issue.* During a ten-year career in regional journalism, she worked as a reporter on the *Birmingham Daily* News, news editor on the Birmingham Metro News and Chief Feature Writer on the Coventry Evening Telegraph, winning Highly Commended in the Feature Writer of the Year category of the 1997 Press Gazette Regional Press Awards. Linda lives in West Yorkshire

Oliver Harris was born in London in 1978. He has an MA in Shakespeare studies from UCL, and a PhD in psychoanalysis from Birkbeck. He is the author of the Nick Belsey series of crime novels, as well as one work of non-fiction: Lacan's Return to Antiquity. He teaches creative writing at Manchester Metropolitan University.

Keith Hutson has written for *Coronation Street* and for many well-known comedians. His award-winning poetry has been widely published both in the UK and internationally.
