Celebrate Durham author **Pat Barker's** new book, *The Voyage Home*, with a dramatic live reading from actors **Philippa Wilson** and **Lauren Waine** and new folk music from the **Shining Levels**.

The Voyage Home is set in the aftermath of the Trojan War. Troy lies in smoking ruins and the victorious Greeks fill their ships with the spoils of battle. Pat Barker once again chronicles the experiences of the women, in this follow-up to her bestselling *The Women of Troy* and the *Silence of the Girls*.

Pat Barker is an internationally acclaimed writer of 16 novels, including the Booker Prizewinning, *The Ghost Road*, from the *Regeneration Trilogy*. She lives and works in Durham.

Adelle Stripe is the author of *Black Teeth and a Brilliant Smile* which was shortlisted for the Gordon Burn Prize and the Portico Prize, and the Sunday Times Bestselling biography of the band Fat White Family, *Ten Thousand Apologies*. She lives in Calderdale.

The Gordon Burn Prize celebrates Gordon's memory by recognising literature that is as forward-thinking and fearless in ambition and execution as his own writing was. Past winners include, Hanif Abdurraquib, David Keenan, Benjamin Myers, Kathryn Scanlan and Preti Taneja.

The Announcement of the Gordon Burn Prize 2025

Join us for the announcement of the winner of the Gordon Burn Prize: an evening of readings from shortlisted writers and live music from The Early Purple.

The Gordon Burn Prize honours the memory of the late Newcastle-born writer Gordon Burn. It celebrates brilliant writing and innovative books that challenge convention, as Gordon's own writing did. This year's judges are writers, Terri White, Carl Anka, Angela Hui, Sarah Phelps and David Whitehouse.

Celebrating writing across all genres including biography, memoir, novels, and short story collections, the prize recognises exceptional writing with an unconventional perspective, style or subject matter and often defies easy categorisation. It celebrates literary outliers and daring and experimental work that often speaks to broader societal issues.

The winner receives a prize of £10,000 and a writing retreat at Gordon Burn's cottage in the Scottish Borders. Past winners have included Benjamin Myers, Denise Mina, David Keenan, Preti Taneja and Kathryn Scanlan.

The Gordon Burn Prize was founded in 2012 by New Writing North, Faber & Faber and the Gordon Burn Trust, and is run in partnership with Newcastle University and NCLA.

You'll learn the basics of point of view and character creation, how to produce settings that add atmosphere to your writing, and all the essentials for structuring and plotting stories.



We are looking for North East based prose writers to join a professional development group in Newcastle. The journey of developing your writing doesn't end when you sign with your agent, get your first book deal, or even when you're publishing your third, fourth or fifth novel. It can be challenging to find other writers at the same stage or teaching that is pitched at the right level. This group will offer continuing craft development and a supportive network for writers navigating life as a professional author.

Beginning in April 2025, the group will have the opportunity to meet on two evenings a month in Newcastle upon Tyne. On the first Wednesday of every month, members can attend a structured craft session led by an experienced practitioner. Members can also opt in to informal monthly sessions, a space to discuss works-in-progress, share experiences and build ongoing relationships that might lead to the exchange of manuscripts for peer review.

Who can apply to be part of this group?

This group is aimed at published authors or agented writers pursuing traditional publication. There is no upper limit on published work, but at minimum accepted members must be represented by an agent or be under contract for their first book. The group is often to fiction writers across any genre, including writing for children or short stories.

The group will be based in central Newcastle upon Tyne, but writers from across the North East may apply. Writers will be expected to manage their own travel to sessions.

Learn what to expect in a drama or comedy writers' room through a two-part series of online workshops. Led by Script Editor Jon Addison (Drama) and Producer Saima Ferdows (Comedy), you'll get to explore a set brief in a collaborative environment where ideas are collectively shared and developed.

Spaces are limited and open by application. Writers should be able to commit to attending the introductory session on 25 February, and either the two Drama workshops on 4 and 11 March 6-8pm, or the two Comedy workshops on 6 and 13 March 6-8pm.

Saima Ferdows is a talented comedy producer known for her work on **Bad Education** and **Sex** Unzipped. With experience in both scripted and unscripted formats, she has contributed to comedy projects including Borat Subsequent Moviefilm.

Jon Addison is a script editor enthusiastic about connecting with emerging talent. He has worked at companies including Pathé, Tiger Aspect and FreeTurn, and has extensive experience across writers' rooms, development, production and post-production.

The Finchale Award, founded by writer Benjamin Myers, awards one short-story writer £1000.

The Sid Chaplin Award supports writers from working-class backgrounds with a £2000 bursary to develop new works of fiction and memoir.

The Tempest Prize, established by poet Andrew McMillan, offers a £1000 bursary and mentoring to an unpublished, LGBTQ+ writer.

The Arvon Award offers a writer the chance to experience an Arvon retreat.

The Northern Promise TLC Awards offer a Free Read manuscript appraisal to writers from underrepresented backgrounds.
