

Book of Crow by Anna Barker Live Theatre, Newcastle Tuesday 17 June, 7.30–8.30pm

Acclaimed North East writer **Anna Barker's** collection of poems, **Book of Crow**, is brought to life in this special performance.

Book of Crow follows the story of Rachel whose mother has died and who makes her grief physical in the form of a belligerent crow. The crow becomes her companion through all the emotions of her loss.

Presented as a dialogue between Rachel and the crow, the poems swing between heartache and humour. The poems will be brought to life by actors, with live music by alt folk group **The Shining Levels**. The Durham band makes music inspired by literature and their first album was a musical companion to *The Gallows Pole* by Benjamin Myers.

This production is a **Durham Book Festival** commission, in partnership with **Live Theatre**, with support from **Arts Council England**.



The 2025 PEN Lecture with Kamila Shamsie

English PEN is one of the world's oldest human rights organisations. It protects freedom of expression whenever it is under attack and celebrates contemporary international writing. The 2025 PEN Lecture will be delivered by award-winning novelist Kamila Shamsie. She will discuss the current state of free expression and how the principles of the PEN Charter hold in our current era of upheaval and conflict. Kamila Shamsie's novels include Best of Friends, Burnt Shadows, Kartography, and Home Fire. A Vice President of the Royal Society of Literature and former Vice President of English PEN, she grew up in Karachi and now lives in London and in Doha where she is the inaugural Writer in Residence at Georgetown University in Qatar.

The 2025 PEN Lecture is hosted in partnership with Newcastle Centre for the Literary Arts, with support from GemArts.




The Rise of Femgore with Lucy Rose and Jessie Elland

Voice Notes is an international creative writing and sound art project exploring the role of the telephone in experiences of migration. In 2025 New Writing North's multilingual writing group World Writes is collaborating with the Voice Notes team to contribute to the project and host a live presentation of the audio work at John Marley Centre in Newcastle's West End.

Featuring multilingual telephone messages from refugees and migrants from around the world, the project offers new ways to think about displaced voices and different modes of reading, writing, talking and listening across cultures.

This event is part of the **PRS New Music Biennial**. A collaboration between composer **Hardi Kurda** and poet **Sarah Jackson**.

Coming in May

The Bee is a website, literary magazine, online community and podcast which celebrates and supports working-class writers. It grew out of A Writing Chance, a New Writing North programme created in response to the lack of opportunities for working-class writers.

The Bee website launches in May, publishing new fiction, non-fiction, photography and interviews by working-class writers and creatives across the UK. The Bee Magazine, its sister print magazine, will be published twice a year, starting autumn 2025. The Working Class Library is our podcast, where Richard Benson (editor, The Bee), Claire Malcolm (CEO, New Writing North) and a guest writer discuss a book and decide whether it deserves a place on the shelves of the imaginary Working Class Library.

The Beehive is a community for new and emerging working-class writers that offers opportunities for development and peer support, launching later this year.

There will be a live recording of the Working Class Library podcast at **Hexham Book Festival** on 3 May 2025, 7.30–8.30pm. Special guest **Kevin Barry** will join Claire and Richard to discuss Frank McCourt's *Angela's Ashes*.
